

DeCoursey, Kinsale, Saint Patrick ...*et alia*.

Norman Knight, sword long shield lance chain-mail horse-backed...an 'eastern seaboard kingdom' of his own, rogue warrior...coins minted as Patrick faced, ancient Patrick the Holy Man of many Gaelic centuries before, of a local folklore, admired, spread far and wide, thus to blend-in the new kingdom to the heritage of the old...Patrick absorbed into a name in family lore, bonding recent family genealogy to ancient local place-lore...fabricating a seamless retrospective ... Patrick a saint absorbed becomes a family name in kingdom's lore...a Hiberno-Norman kingdom Kinsale to Armagh 'forevermore'...

DeMontmorency (DeMarisco) Welch Marches Lords and Strongbow...Strongbow as DeClare, as of Normandy as of Conquered Wales...merchants and settlers from what would later be the Low Countries, Breton and some of Normandy, Normandy of the Souterrain Refuges of a Medieval France, Settlements come to be some portside and some to inland territories...DeCogan and FitzStephen divide up the cantreds...DeCogan to Connaught and the locals take to the underground...deCogan at Dunisky to the West, FitzStephen at Imokilly as Caput, a sub-infeudation begins, Henry II citizen rights of Bristol to a defended marsh island settlement the town of Cork comes to be absorbing that which had been monastic and Viking in its periphery...a history of trading Cork to Bristol many

a century of merchant barques to and fro, Skiddy and Gould and many more ...

FitzStephen settlement in Imokilly by the Gael besieged, Strongbow sets his uncle and informant DeMarisco to accompany FitzStephen, Rostellan mentioned in De Monmorency DeMarisco genealogy...FitzStephen settlement by the sea at Rostellan perhaps...FitzStephen becomes Gaelicised to become *Mac Sleighne*... and consequent presence of DeMarisco...a 'castellum' and settlers at Rostellan shore perhaps...castle of earthworks and timber with timber frame houses to make a village which will for a time become a corporate town, and a 'parish' church and graveyard, lands for garrison and settlers to defend and to work the clearances and consequent allotments of land...and pleasant days in the meadow and the common.

DeMontmorency DeMarisco at Lundy Island in the channel by Bristol's shore...piratical legends and much more...Templar pirates and Ottoman shores... Jocelyn DeMarisco fell at Acre in the Holy Land... knights in retirement at Templar preceptories at Cobh Island...Once Jerusalem was a Crusader state... Mural towers on early Irish town walls...Early mural walls at Cork, at Wexford and Youghal...masonry hard-fastening once earthwork boundaries...DeCogan meets family at Rouen's Court, stands in the doorway of a stepped stairway...DeCogan and FitzStephen to

Aghadoe monastery and a *Teampaill Aghadoe* (of the two graveyard yew trees?) appears at Dunisky by Macroom, aspirations of 'becoming more Irish than the Irish themselves'...absorbing the Patrick legend... merchant mariners Bristol's Marches to Cork's Marshes...

Temple Michael a 'castellum' mural tower and curtain wall fragments overlook the Blackwater, a towerhouse of later times within, by Youghal by *Dar Inis* (a Deir monastery, a hiberno-byzantine foundation, a causeway island), then by Pilmore, Fitzgeraldo Italian and Lombardi's chore taxes for the Pope to feed the papal poor...Raymond Le Gros (The Fat Man) to God at *Dar Inis* forevermore and a river of blood beside the shore...lancet windows still grasp at the sunlight on a fine day...at Rhincrew overlooking towards the Blackwater entering the sea, a Knight of Mourne becomes nought but legendary...ghost sentinels at the walls of Liscarrol and Mourne remain witness to what once had been, at Donoughmore...horsebells ringing as a war procession leaves a dysart (*díseart*) ...elsewhere DeLacy the Lord of Meath spurred a stirrup into horse flank and rode northwards from Trim Castle...Rostellan villagers tend the fields as the chill of winter is felt and the ringing of a *cloighteach's* angelus bell is chimed from beyond the woodland, that woodland beside the farsid...and an apple tree sheds its autumnal leaves beside the Donjon of the Manor of Inchiquin, by Pilmore Harbour by the sea...
